

Talk with your academic advisor to see what course requirements you need to fulfill.





Learn about scholarships and other types of financial aid to help cover costs.





Pay attention to costs associated with the program and create a budget for personal expenses.





Research your host country/community's culture/social norms and learn some basic phrases in the language.



Determine your housing options (dorm, apartment, host family, etc.).





Prepare all necessary documents and paperwork (passport, visas, etc.).





Arrange flights and transportation from the airport to where you are staying.





Make a packing list and only pack what you need.





Read up on current events in your own country and be prepared to talk about them with locals.





Determine communication channels with family and friends and set expectations for communication.





Know your priorities and what you want to get out of the experience.





Find out the location of the United States embassy, the closest police station, and the closest hospital.





Get all necessary medical check-ups (physical, dental, vaccinations, etc.) before leaving.





Know how you will access funds and be aware of foreign transaction fees on debit/credit cards.





Understand safety concerns in your host country.





Have a back-up plan in case your technology fails.





Meet with a study abroad advisor to discuss any personal matters (religion, identity, disability accommodations, etc.).





Adjust to your host country's laws, customs, and culture instead of expecting them to adjust to you.





Watch for culture shock (feeling "blue" or avoiding doing things for more than a few days).





Break out of your comfort zone and seek out experiences and opportunities that will make you stand out.





Keep a journal, notebook, or blog to document your experiences.





Seek out experiences off the beaten path and beyond the typical tourist areas.





Befriend the locals and ask questions.





Be conscious of your environmental and economic impact.





Continue to ask questions and discover cultural knowledge about your host country.



Continue practicing any language that you learned while abroad.





Maintain relationships you developed while abroad.





Connect your study abroad experience with your program of study, research, and coursework.





Find a student organization that allows you to build on your study abroad experience.





Make connections with other students who have studied abroad.





If possible, go on some weekend excursions outside of your host town.





Talk to your friends and encourage others to study abroad.





Reflect on how you are growing and changing while abroad.





Consciously analyze both similarities and differences between your home and host cultures.





When appropriate, try behaving like a local.





Know how to talk to family friends about your experience without overwhelming them.





Create a scrapbook or some other art project to relive your memories.





Explore your home country and note the similarities and differences between your experiences.





Plan your next trip abroad.





Maintain a balance between your studies, extracurricular activities, and leisure time.





Remember that you must still abide by your home institution's rules while abroad.





Prepare for reverse cultureshock when you return to your home country.





Know how to utilize your study abroad experience for professionalization (resumés, cover letters, interviews, etc.).





Talk to a study abroad advisor to figure out next steps after returning home.
