

BE SPECIFIC! (SNOWFLAKE) LESSON PLAN

Overview:

This lesson plan challenges participants to practice active listening skills and understand the value of clear and effective communication. They will create a paper snowflake based on simple directions that are provided by the facilitator and then discuss how each of them interpreted the directions.

Background:

This activity was created by Donna M. Stringer and Patricia A. Cassiday and is in their 2009 book, 52 Activities for Improving Cross-Cultural Communication (see citation below).

Objectives:

As a result of this activity, participants will be able to:

- 1. "Experience how often we may assume that others understand what we mean."
- 2. "Identify how important specific language by the speaker can be in creating genuine understanding.
- 3. Identify how important it can be for the listener to ask questions to ensure effective communication" (Stringer & Cassiday, 2009, p. 145).

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30 minutes

Group Size:

Entire group

Materials:

One sheet of lightweight paper for each team of participants and one sheet for the facilitator.
