

## Introduction:

This activity encourages participants to engage with Stella Ting Toomey's 1999 concept of *transcultural communication competence* and apply this model to revisit and reflect on an unresolved intercultural interaction.

As a result of this activity, participants will be able to:

- 1. Reflect critically on an intercultural interaction.
- 2. Assess the success and effectiveness of that interaction using Ting-Toomey's (1999) transcultural communication competence model.

# AAC&U Intercultural Knowledge and Competence Goals:

**Cultural Self-Awareness** 

• To articulate insights into own cultural rules and biases (e.g., seeking complexity; aware of how their experiences have shaped these rules, and how to recognize and respond to cultural biases, resulting in a shift in self-description).

Verbal and Nonverbal Communication

- To articulate a complex understanding of cultural differences in verbal and nonverbal communication (e.g., demonstrates understanding of the degree to which people use physical contact while communicating in different cultures or use direct/indirect and explicit/implicit meanings).
- To skillfully negotiate a shared understanding based on these differences.
