



Fall Semester 2019 (iLEAD) International, Leadership, Enrichment, Adaptation, and Development

Workshop Objectives

This workshop is open to Visiting Research Scholars, who are working at Purdue's West Lafayette campus. Participants will complete brief readings, guided assignments, and reflections which will document their learning and create a portfolio of individual skill acquisition; thereby increasing cultural self-awareness and an ability to work effectively with people from other cultures.

Participants will engage in discussion with peers and intercultural learning mentors to develop skills and strategies for coping with living and working abroad. Assignments and mentor feedback will encourage participants to connect with their host culture and to better understand the similarities and differences between their host culture and home country; particularly as regards adapting to living and working in an American work and research setting. In so doing, Participants will become better able to articulate and demonstrate the component leadership skills of "interpersonal and intercultural effectiveness" as defined in the new *Purdue Undergraduate Core Curriculum*:

- Intercultural Curiosity
- Intercultural Verbal and Non-Verbal Communication
- Intercultural Openness
- Intercultural Empathy
- Worldview Frameworks

- Strategic Planning
- Professional Strengths
- Awareness of Self
- Awareness of Others
- Emotional Resilience
- Bridging Techniques

Course Format

Each week during the 8-week period ahead of each class meeting, participants will be given a journal writing prompt for reflections on topics linked to developing one or more of the above skills. The writing prompt will be tied to that week's lesson. These reflections will be used to facilitate discussions among the participants and mentors and inform activities and instruction used during the 90 minute course meetings.

How much work is involved?

Participants are expected to attend eight 90-minute class meetings and spend roughly 20-30 minutes each week in reflection journal writing. Additionally, participants will occasionally be assigned supplemental readings, surveys, and community engagement activities that will vary in time commitment.

Assessment

Successful completion of this workshop is a requirement of the J-Visa. In order to pass this workshop, you must a) attend all workshop sessions (or an equivalent makep-up) and b) complete all assignments.

Additionally, participants will be required to complete a series of formative and summative surveys and assessments.

Assignments:
